FROM THE PRESIDENT

For over 50 years, Goodwill Industries of Central Alabama (GICA) has provided training, employment, and placement services for people with disabilities. In a year marked by opportunities and challenges, 2019 was by all measures a success. The revenue from our ten (10) retail stores and government contract services provided jobs at Goodwill for 165 people with disabilities. The operation of our stores is only possible because of the generous donations of clothing and household goods throughout our region. We are always thankful for the donations needed to stock our stores and provide jobs. We have continued to strengthen our working relationship with the Alabama Department of Rehabilitation Services (ADRS) and broaden our array of programs. Of all the ways Goodwill can measure success, the most important metric is the people we serve and the dignity, hope, and sense of independence provided by the opportunities to work. In addition to the 165 persons with disabilities directly employed by Goodwill, 126 adults referred by ADRS were provided job evaluations, job readiness, job retention and job placement services. A new point of emphasis over the past year has been Youth and Prison Services. We are providing Smart Work Ethics training to high school students and prison inmates. In addition, Vocational College Tours, Workplace Tours, and Summer Job Exploration Work are being conducted for high school students. This past year 662 youth received job services from Goodwill. Of course, none of what we do would be possible without the generosity of our donors, and the loyalty, dedication, and hard work of our employees, who embody our Mission. Tom "Red" Perry was in a car accident in 2001. He suffered a spinal cord injury that left him paralyzed from the waist down. When Red first had the accident he felt depressed and overwhelmed. He worked hard to overcome those feelings and instead have a positive, upbeat attitude on life. Red has been working for Goodwill a little over

two years. He works at the Eastern Boulevard retail store. The state has provided Red with an electric wheelchair to use while he is working at the store. The chair allows him to take on larger tasks at work. He enjoys greeting donors, collecting donations and helping his team members.

"I love being around customers. I like getting out and doing something with my life. I didn't want to just sit and watch TV all day. I am thankful that places like Goodwill exist, so people with disabilities can get out and work." – Tom "Red" Perry

Stephen Ward

Stephen Ward has been with Goodwill for six years. When he first started at Goodwill, he worked in the recycling department at the Air Base Boulevard plant. He eventually wanted more interaction with customers, so he began working at our Prattville retail store location. He loves accepting donations and meeting new customers. Stephen was born with limited hearing that led to the loss of all hearing in his right ear. It used to be a struggle for him to understand what others were saying, but with the help of a cochlear implant and learning to read lips, he is able to communicate with more ease. Over the years, people bullied Stephen for his disabilities, but Goodwill has given him the confidence to overcome those insecurities.
